LGBT Rights in Canada

These are some important dates in the evolution of legal rights for GLBT persons in Canada.

1969	Homosexuality is decriminalized.
1978	New immigration legislation removes homosexuals from the list of people who are ineligible for Canadian citizenship.
1996	The federal government passes Bill C-33, adding sexual orientation to the list of prohibited grounds of discrimination under the <i>Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms</i> .
2000	The House of Commons and the Senate pass Bill C-23, giving same-sex couples access to the same social and tax benefits as opposite-sex couples in common-law relationships.
2003	The Ontario and British Columbia Courts of Appeal find the definition of marriage excluding same-sex unions to be unconstitutional. Judges allow gay and lesbian marriages in these two provinces.

- ✓ Write the dates on the board and have Ss predict what legal right or
 protection was added in that year.
- ✓ Have Ss research these rights and present their findings to the class.
- ✓ Post the rights without the dates attached around the room and have Ss circulate, discuss, and guess the year.

Here are some tips to get your started. Work with your group to add more. When you are finished, share your ideas with the whole class.

- Learn about the cultural backgrounds, lives and interests of employees outside of the workplace.
- Don't assume everyone is heterosexual.
- Organize collective meals where employees can learn about one another's cultures by sharing food.
- Use the term "partners" when inviting spouses to social activities.
- Recognize special days and events such as International Day of Persons with Disabilities, International Day to End Racism, Gay Pride celebrations, etc.
