Ideas for Teachers

- Have students locate an application form for a recreation subsidy for their municipality. Have students practice filling out the application form using their own information, or made up information.
- ➤ Have students role play calling someone to follow up on their subsidy application or to get more information about day camp options for their child.
- ➤ Have students write an email to enquire about volunteering at a day camp.
- ➤ Have groups of students look for info on different camps in their communities and present the information they find.
