Instructions for Using the BC Day Jeopardy Game

Set Up

- 1. Set up a laptop (with PowerPoint) and projector.
- 2. Orient the students to "Jeopardy" by showing them a clip of the show. (There are lots on YouTube.)
- 3. Divide into teams. Give each team a bell, buzzer or other noise maker.
- 4. Provide a score board and prizes.
- 5. A student or teacher can play the role of Alex.
- 6. Use slideshow mode in PowerPoint.
- 7. Navigate to the question slide by clicking on the dollar amount.
- 8. Reveal questions by clicking on coloured question slide.
- 9. Return to main game board by clicking on arrow on the bottom left corner.

Rules

- 10. Answers must be in the form of a question! "What is Whistler?"
- 11. Teams can confer, but only one team member can provide answer.
- 12. If teams form a question wrong or shout out answers, come up with a penalty.
- 13. If the answer is wrong, another team can buzz in.
- 14. If all teams get the question wrong, the points are lost.
- 15. When board is cleared, the team with the most dollars wins!

Variation

• Give each team a laptop, and 3 minutes to Google the correct answer.

Note: The game board is fully editable. "Save As..." and create your own Jeopardy game to review any facts.
