

Ideas for using the video in class

- ✓ Have students guess the answers to the comprehension questions prior to watching the video
 (Option: Divide them into teams to compete for the largest number of correct answers).
- ✓ Have students describe the graphs taken from the videos to one another.
- ✓ Do a class census and create your own graphs and statistics. How do they compare to the 2011 census?
- ✓ Have students write five statements about trends in Canada based on the video.

Discussion questions

- 1. Every five years, Statistics Canada collects information about Canada's population using the census. What are the benefits and potential uses of this information?

- 3. Visible minorities are self-identified. How might this affect statistics?
- 4. Since only three in 10 visible minorities were born in Canada, what does this indicate about changes to immigration trends in recent years?


Comprehension questions

- 5. What are the three largest visible minority groups in Canada?
- 6. What percentage of immigrants can hold a conversation in more than one language?
- 7. What are the four most common non-official languages known by immigrants?
- 8. What is the largest religion in Canada?
- 9. What percentage of Canadians do not have a religious affiliation?




