Task Give a presentation contrasting public and private health care.

Tool Scoring Guide

This task could be used with the Body & Mind unit from the ELSA 6&7 Curriculum Guidelines or a similar unit.

- 1. At the end of the Core Curriculum component centred on Health Literacy, have Ss research the two healthcare systems and compare the public vs. private health care plans. Ss can use resources listed in the ELSA 6 Curriculum Guidelines on pages 14 17 (http://www.listn.info/site/resources/resources-for-teachers/elsa-67-curriculum-guidelines/e6), such as the CBC News in Depth: "Health Care", 2006; the Iron Warrior: "Should Canada Allow Two Tier Healthcare?", 2011; and The Globe & Mail four-part debate on Canadian Health Care, 2010.
- 2. Instruct Ss to present a short informal report on public and private health care plans, based on their research comparing two health systems.
- 3. Before Ss prepare their presentation, review the rubric with the class to inform them of the expectations of the presentation as well as to outline the analytic items that will be focused on.
- 4. Give Ss an opportunity to ask about each item so that they are clear about what they will need to deliver.
- 5. Use the following rubric to capture the results of their performance, make some notes for the Ss to improve upon, and think about how you can support your Ss in future classes with their informal presentation skills.
- 6. Optional: while evaluating presentations using the rubric, ask Ss to rate their own performance using the same rubric.
- 7. Meet with Ss individually to compare each set of ratings and discuss any differences.
